Dark grey powder coated steel to all metalwork such as armrests, new feature railings and litter bins.



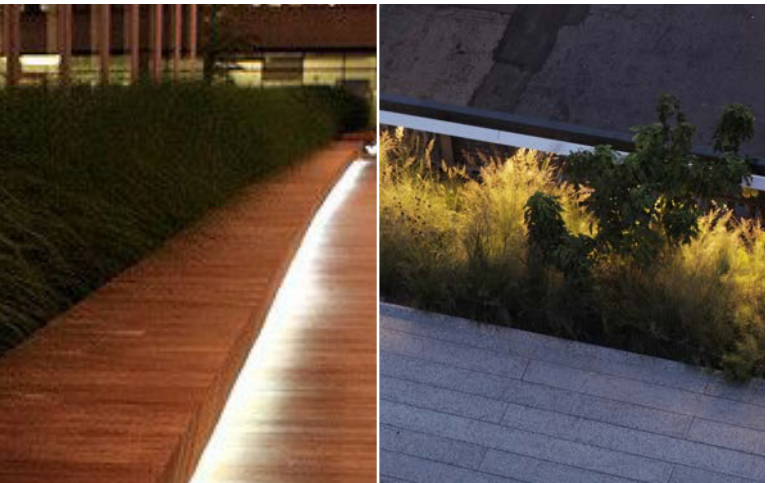
Timber to seating edges, to provide back and armrests (with anti-skate protection).

- Evoke a sense of refuge, enclosure and intimacy.

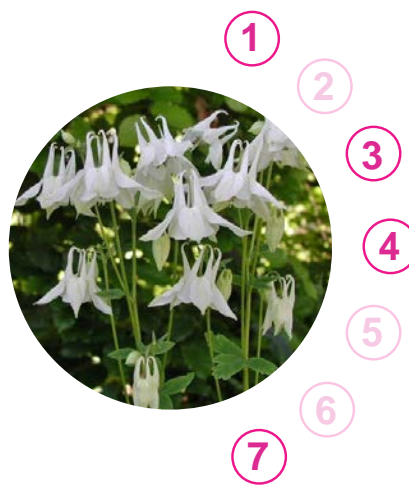

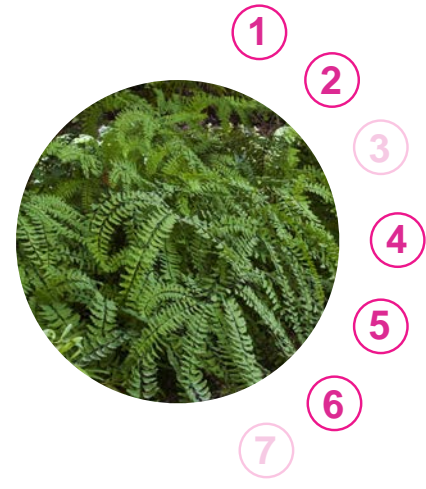

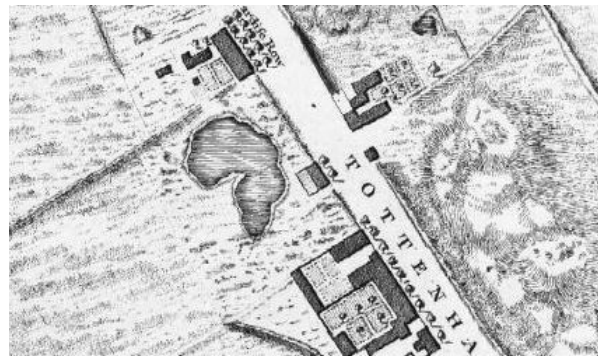

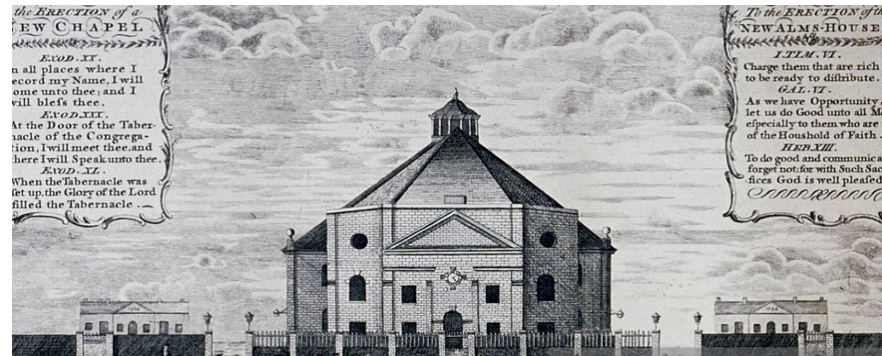
